

This year's stewardship theme is a perfect metaphor for this time at St. Matthew's. The light of the Lord is everywhere as you build upon your long ministry with Mother Nancy and prepare for new ministry with your next Rector.

The light of the Lord shines in the darker corners of our buildings, allowing us to go through what you have stored away in order to see what to keep and what to discard.

The light of the Lord shines through the exquisite windows in our sanctuary as we worship together in song and silence.

The light of the Lord shines in our conversations during our Listening Sessions, during meetings when the Episcopal Church Men and the Women of St. Matthew's make plans for continuing our traditions and for serving God in new ways.

The light of the Lord shines on the diverse communities who gather in our chapel on Wednesday mornings and Saturday afternoons.

The light of the Lord was shining on our Parish Hall when we welcomed about 60 guests to our first 4 Corners Friendship Dinner on September 22<sup>nd</sup>.

The light of the Lord will show us God's way as we walk together in the coming months. At times it might be as bright as the sun; at others it may be as gentle as the moon, or as elusive as starlight. At times it might shine in front of us, marking a clear path; at others it might shine behind us, so that we walk in the gentle shadows of our memories.

It is such a joy and privilege *to walk in the light of the Lord* with you during these days! In the words of a Scottish blessing:

*May the blessing of light be on us, light without and light within. May the blessed sunlight shine on us like a great peat fire, so that stranger and friend may come and warm themselves at it. . . . And may light shine out of the two eyes of each of us, like a candle set in the window of a house, bidding the wanderer come in out of the storm. And now may the Lord bless us, and bless us kindly.*

*For the beauty of the earth!* [Hymnal 416]

I grew up in a place where we only had two seasons each lasting roughly six months: dry season and rainy season. Liberia is near the equator. The temperature was always the same, regardless of the weather conditions, rainy or dry. It was always humid in Liberia, near the equator.

In church we sang songs with phrases like "as white as snow," when we did not know what snow was. In school, we studied the geography of our country and other countries. We learned about the four seasons of America: winter, spring, summer and autumn (fall).

I could not understand the difference in the four seasons. Debbie set me down and taught me the signs to see and know which season we are in. After a few more months, the tree leaves began to change into beautiful colors which I had never seen in my life. Debbie says, we are in the season of fall. Sure enough, the leaves started falling off the trees. I had to rake the leaves. This never happened in Liberia. The leaves would turn brown, but not fall off the trees.

I experienced my first snow in 2013 in Worcester. When it was announced on television one night that there would be snow the next day, I could not sleep and waited all night to see snow for the first time in my life. When I saw snowflakes, I thought I could catch the flakes and hold them in my hand. I thought the flakes were manna from heaven. Debbie said, "No dear, that is not manna. Manna comes every day and is fresh. It goes away at night. This is snow, it will be around for six months. We are stuck with it." Though the winter looks beautiful when everything around turned white, I liked it but could never get used to the cold. I thought the trees would never grow leaves again. But Debbie told me the trees hibernated during the winter.

## Stewardship

### *Shining Our Light*

When it was time for spring, I began to see the trees getting small buds, then flowers. Debbie told me this is spring, when everything begins to turn green again. That was a beautiful bright green color. Soon, everything became a beautiful deep lush green, especially the grass and the lawns. It looked much like my native Liberia, where everything is green all year round. The temperature went up and I didn't have to wear my heavy clothes. This was summer.

After all I learned about the four seasons, I began to see something that I could not understand. Every time after the winter there would always be construction everywhere. Then I said to Debbie, "It seems that technically, America could just say that they have just two seasons here: winter and construction seasons. Spring, summer and fall are all about construction."

I think I love fall the most, and praise and thank God for the beauty of this season. The beauty of fall is amazingly spectacular. I say to myself, indeed there is a time for every season, for everything. God is great and is truly in control of the beauty of the earth.

The Psalmist says it rightly, "*The earth is the Lord's and the fulness thereof, the world and they that dwell therein...*" [Psalm 24]. If God has given us such beauty of the earth and shows how much He loves us, it should be our duty and responsibility to be good stewards of these gifts of the earth.

I am carried away by the beauty of nature, God's creation. I commend to you the diocesan work on Creation Care and the work of our missionary Rev. Margaret Bullitt-Jonas. 

**Monastic Musings:  
Fr. John Julian OJN  
Giving to the Institution**

The Latin word for “to stand” is the verb *sto* (in its other verb forms: *stare*, *stedi*, and *status*). One can see how the word “statute” comes from this root, and by a slightly more devious route, we find the same origin behind the word “institution.” An institution is something which has been “set up” or “established” to stand. And that is not a bad thing. If it were not for “institutions,” we would live lives of complete unpredictability, never knowing from one moment to the next what, when, who, or how a thing was going to happen or get done.

That was one of the problems that faced the early Church. They had no buildings, no paid clergy, no set times for services, no established programs. Everything had to be handled on a moment-to-moment basis. If there was a bishop or deacon available, you could have Sunday Eucharist-if you could find a place-if you could inform the congregation in time-if the soldiers didn’t arrest the celebrant beforehand, etc. Eventually, there were just not enough bishops to go around, so bishops “invented” priests as substitutes. But when Christianity became legal, Christians were able to center on one place-a building that eventually came to be called “a church.” And then regular hours for services were established (eventually full-time), and clergy staffs developed who needed housing; education programs were undertaken that needed classrooms in which to meet. And you have the story of the beginning of the Church becoming “an institution.” For those early Roman Christians, it would have been heavenly to have a building, regular clergy, classes, etc.

But with “the institution” came all the needs and requirements of the institution to

maintain itself: buildings, classrooms, roofs, drains, heat, salaries, living quarters—and eventually, retirement funds, health and building insurance, kitchens, printing costs, etc. With the ten-percent tithes of all of its members, the Church had little or no trouble. But when the tithe went “out of fashion,” then there was a reliance on the voluntary gifts of the members. (Curiously enough, one of the reasons the British bishops did not want to consecrate Samuel Seabury was that there was no guarantee of financial support for him-only voluntary offerings of American Episcopalians.)

But here we are—institutionalized! And if we are to benefit, we must have the means to support it. If the Church had the tithes once again, this wouldn’t require a second thought. But WE can have the best of both worlds: we can have the tithe----and have it as a voluntary gift! It is our intention as good “stewards” that this “institution” shall stand! You can make it so!
